Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Iane Cottage is located at 4 Rockledge Road in the village of Saranac Iake, Essex County. It is situated at the entrance of Rockledge Park, a wooded area on the outskirts of the village. The area is sparsely settled. Another house is located immediately to the south, but the remaining three sides of the property, including the street side, border woods. The lawn is on a moderate grade, which slopes downward toward the rear. The house is oriented in an east-southeast direction, with a driveway on the southern edge of the property leading to a contributing two-car garage. A small stone retaining wall runs along the north end of the property very near the house.

The house is L-shaped in plan. The principle entry, on Rockledge Road, is almost at ground level (to the right) through a small open gabled portico with gracefully curved gable returns. The portico is recessed and is centered under the end gable of the house, which is a jerkin head gable. The contributing garage features a matching jerkin head gable roof. Set on a concrete block foundation, the cottage is clad in cedar shingles and surmounted by an asphalt shingle roof. Windows on the main facade contain six-over-one light sash, with smaller but similar windows on the second floor.

The interior features a central hall plan with a living room to the left, a dining room to the right, and pantry and kitchen to the rear. Three other rooms and a bath are located off the central hall. Two stairways lead to upstairs bedrooms. One of the stairways may be reached from outdoors, behind the cure porch.

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A cure porch on the left side of the house is reached from the living room through double French doors, five feet in width. The walls and ceiling are finished with beaded board, the floor is painted wood. The doorway has a sill with a slight step-down to the porch. Four 12-pane fixed sash windows enclose the east (street) side of the porch. The south side of the porch is completely screened in with removable storm windows. The west end has a sliding window and a stationary window, each with twelve panes. An enclosed stairway to the upstairs apartment takes up some of the space of the cure porch.

Iane Cottage is architecturally significant as a private cure cottage built in the post-World War I "boom" period of development in Saranac Lake. The house was constructed about 1923 by Ernest Shaw for his tubercular wife Isabelle B. Shaw. The Shaws had two young sons whom they feared might contract tuberculosis from their mother. For this reason, a separate, adjacent house was built for them at 26 East Pine Street. This is the only known example of such an arrangement in Saranac Lake. Isabell Shaw died in 1926 and the house was subsequently sold in 1933. It has been a private residence since that time, but was used for the purposes of a cure cottage through the 1930's.

The cure cottages of Saranac Lake were predominantly built between the years of 1870 and 1930 and represent almost every housing type popular in the late Nineteenth and early Twentieth century. They represent vernacular expressions of architectural styles which include Italianate, Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, Tudor Revival, and bungalow stylistic features. The majority of the cottages which remain were built between 1890 and 1930.

The most common cure cottages are vernacular expressions of the Queen Anne and Colonial Revival styles, with multiple gables, balloon frame construction, decorative wooden architectural detail, multiple windows of various sizes and shapes, and associated porches or verandas. Glass-enclosed porches, used for the curing of tuberculosis patients, are the most salient feature of the cure cottage. They can be found on local structures built long after porches had gone out of fashion elsewhere.

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Cure cottages are structures that can be commercial, residential or institutional in scale and expression. Many were built specifically to function as private commercial sanitoria, multiple unit dwellings, boarding houses, or private homes. Equally large numbers of cure cottages were adapted for that use from vernacular single family dwellings. All cure cottages display certain architectural features which were necessary for specific functions in the process of curing tuberculosis outdoors. Whether added at a later date or incorporated into the original building design, these features can include multiple—storied cure porches, sliding glass panels, call bells and wider—than—usual doorways without sills.

The cottage has undergone very little alteration over the years and has changed hands only a few times since its original construction. It retains a high degree of integrity.
